

# Select and determine Evidence-Based Programs for inclusion in Georgia's Title IV-E Prevention Plan

Informed by the work of the **Prevention Services Workgroup** prior to submission of Georgia's Title IV-E Prevention Plan 2021

EBP-selection will be focused on Evidence-Based Programs that are rated 1) well-supported or 2) likely to be rated well-supported\* before plan submission on the Title IV-E Clearinghouse

#### EBPs likely to be well-supported are EBPs that:

- Are currently under review by the Title IV-E Clearinghouse
- Have any amount of presence in Georgia; based on provider-survey conducted in February-March 2021, and
- Are rated well-supported or supported on the California Evidence-Based Clearinghouse (CEBC)

# The three core target populations

- 1. Children and families in Ongoing Services/ Family Preservation and their caregivers
- 2. Children/youth post permanency and their caregivers
- 3. Pregnant and parenting youth in foster care



Identified Characteristics and Needs - and Capturing Fit



# Recap: The characteristics of the target population

- To recommend EBPs for Georgia, we considered the ages of children and youth in the families we will be serving statewide
- To identify the age-ranges of highest priority, this workgroup reviewed and analyzed the following sources of data and input:
  - Data on the ages of children and youth
  - Focus groups
  - Poll results and chat input from this workgroup



## Recap: Identified priority age ranges across data sources



#### Target population data:

- · Nearly half of children are 0-5 years
- · Infants are most over-represented
- **Teens** are under-represented
- **Infants, toddlers, & teens** enter foster care more often than they receive family preservation services



#### Focus groups:

- Infants and their caregivers
- Teens



#### Workgroup input from chat and poll

- POLL: **Teenagers** (33%), **infants** (21%) and **toddlers** (17%)
- · Chat: **Teenagers** and **infants** mentioned most times.



# The priority age-ranges of the target population

Triangulating this information, we identified the following priority ageranges for EBP fit:

Priority age-ranges
Infants (0-1 year)
Teenagers (13-17 years)
Toddlers (2-3 years)

We will document which of the 21 EBPs under consideration serve one of more of these priority age-ranges.



# Recap: The needs of the target population

- To recommend EBPs for Georgia, we considered the needs of children and youth in the families we will be serving in Georgia
- The EBPs are categorized in three different service types: 1) Mental health,
   2) Substance Abuse Disorder, and 3) In-Home Parenting Skills.
- To identify the needs of highest priority, this workgroup reviewed and analyzed the following sources of data and input:
  - Data on allegations
  - Data on removal reasons
  - Focus group
  - Poll results and chat input from this workgroup



## Recap: Identified priority age ranges across data sources



#### Target population data:

- · Prenatal exposure (adult SUD) in allegations data
- · SUD in removal reasons data
- · Neglect in removal reasons data
- · Inadequate housing, food in allegations and removal reasons data



#### Focus groups:

- Mental health needs for both children and caregivers
- Parenting skills (conflicts, attachment-focused)
- Concrete support (financial supports, housing)
- Targeting family as a whole



#### Workgroup input from chat and poll

- **POLL**: MH in combination with parenting (22%), MH in combination with SUD (15%), Mental health needs for youth (14%)
- · Chat: Trauma-informed approach



# The priority needs of the target population

Triangulating this information, we identified the following priority needs for EBP fit:

#### **Priority needs**

Substance Abuse Disorder (adult)

Mental Health (children/youth/adult) in combination with parenting needs (adult)

Parenting (adult\*)

Substance Abuse Disorder (adult - maternal focus)

Mental Health (children/youth/adult) in combination with Substance Abuse Disorder(children/youth/adult)

Mental Health (children/youth)

\*including pregnant/parenting youth in foster care

We will document which of the 21 EBPs under consideration address one of more of these priority needs.



# The priority needs of the target population

- All identified needs were not categorized under the three service types: mental health, substance abuse disorder and parenting.
- We also identified and included two additional needs indicating EBP fit:

#### **Additional needs**

The EBP target the whole family (and not just one member)

The EBP focus on building capacity to handle conflicts between caregiver/child

- The identified need for a *trauma-informed approach* is an official requirement under Family First that apply to all the EBPs for consideration.
- We also heard explicit need for concrete supports (financial support, housing)
  and acknowledges the importance of this need. DFCS is committed to
  promoting provision of concrete supports above and beyond the EBPs selected
  for Family First. This will be further explored.



# **Applying fit indicators to our 21 EBPs**

Data and insights from this workgroup tell us which EBPs will *fit* or best align with the context in Georgia.

This workgroup will review many criteria to inform EBP selection. We will develop *fit indicators* to capture and document our insights about EBP fit, such as Georgia's priority age ranges and needs.

The fit indicators **do not reflect the value or quality** of each EBP. These are all great EBPs. Focusing on fit helps us make challenging choices prioritizing among a strong set of EBPs.

The fit indicators presented today represent the **FIRST step.** More information will be reviewed across several meetings in this workgroup.



# To what extent is the fit-indicator crosswalk clear to you?







## The volume and location of SUD-EBPs in Georgia





## **High level findings**

- The most prevalent service type in the EBP service array in Georgia: Mental Health programs
- Approximately 40% of the counties in Georgia do not offer **EBPs targeting** in-home parenting skills.
- Lack of all service types of EBPs in rural areas in Georgia.
- General **lack of EBPs focusing on combinations of needs**, for example, Mental Health *and* In-Home Parenting Skills, as well as Substance Abuse Disorder *and* Mental Health etc.
- Clear need for services targeting teenagers, especially In-Home Parenting Skills EBPs.





## The process moving forward

Chapin Hall and DFCS Family First Team will assess each EBP according to the following criteria:

Questions to be answered	Fit Indicator
To what extent does the EBP address an identified <i>service gap</i> statewide or in specific region(s)?	Fit indicators will be collaboratively developed to reflect top identified service gaps. EBPs meeting these priority service gaps will be captured in fit indicator cross-walk

This will serve as the second (of several) steps in the EBP selection process whereby multiple indicators will be collaboratively developed and applied to our 21 EBPs.
