Introduction to Family First, Title IV-E Clearinghouse and the terminology



Landmark legislation: Most significant child welfare law to pass in 20 years

Dramatically alters the federal financing structure for child welfare programming (Title IV-E).

Policy themes:

- Prevent unnecessary placement
- Promote family based care

RINT FAMILY FIRST The Family First Prevention Services Act

States can receive 50% reimbursement for *qualified prevention services* provided to:

- "candidate" children at imminent risk of foster care entry, their parents and/or kin caregivers.
- youth in foster care who are pregnant or parenting

GA candidacy definition

Children at imminent risk of entering foster care will be defined as **children who receive Ongoing Services (Family Preservation)**

BLUE RINT The Family First Prevention Services Act

There are 3 categories of prevention services:

- 1) Mental health treatment
- 2) Substance abuse treatment and prevention
- 3) In-home, skill-based parenting programs

All prevention services must be provided within a trauma-informed organizational structure and treatment framework.

BLUE PRINT To draw down prevention funds, states must...

- 1. Have an approved 5-year *state Prevention Plan*
 - Includes a list of EBP services for which the state will claim
- 2. Be implementing FFPSA congregate care provisions
- 3. Use programs rated and approved by the Title IV-E Prevention Services Clearinghouse

The Title IV-E Clearinghouse and the terminology

States must use evidenced-based programs (EBPs) rated and approved by the Title IV-E Prevention Services Clearinghouse.

The Title IV-E Prevention Services Clearinghouse was established:

- by the Administration for Children and Families (ACF) within the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services (HHS).
- to conduct an objective and transparent review of research on programs and services intended to provide enhanced support to children and families and prevent foster care placements.

What is an Evidence-Based Program?

Evidence-based programs are programs that have been rigorously tested in controlled settings, proven effective, and translated into practical models that are widely available to communitybased organizations

The Title IV-E Clearinghouse and the terminology

• The Clearinghouse rates EBPs in the following four categories:



- As of March 2021, the Clearinghouse approved 29 programs in the first three categories. 22 programs did not meet criteria
- The Clearinghouse has developed a working list of the next programs and services planned for systematic review. There are currently 29 programs on the list for planned review.
- At least 50 percent of a state's total FFPSA prevention expenditures must be for "well-supported" services by 2024



VALUES

- Children and youth have the right to form and maintain stable and healthy attachments with family and supportive adults and remain in their home communities.
- Children and youth deserve to be safe from harm.
- Children and families do best in communities that cohesive, empowered, and supported.
- Individual and family identity, culture, and tradition are respected and affirmed.
- Identifying, addressing and reducing disproportionality and structural racism is essential for achieving our shared vision.
- Child welfare is part of a network of agencies and community-based actors collectively responsible for child safety and family well-being.
- Our workforce is a valuable asset and must be empowered to achieve our vision.

IMPACT

Children and youth spend less time in foster care and more time with family.

Communities and families are strengthened and empowered.

Families have increased resiliency, self-sufficiency, stability, and lasting connections.

The Prevention Services Workgroup:

- Informs recommendations for Family First EBPs for Georgia's Title IV-E Prevention Plan.
 Final decisions are made by the Steering Committee based on the workgroup's recommendation.
- Recommendations should reflect best interest of children and families in Georgia.
- **Represents members from service providers and DFCS** across State of Georgia with expertise related to child welfare and prevention services.
- Participation in this group does not influence future family first contracting.



As part of planning the process for this workgroup, we have engaged a small Core Group, that...

- represents key internal and external stakeholder groups including sister agencies
- guides development of decision-making frameworks for the Prevention Services Workgroup
- offer ad hoc assistance in validating and/or developing processes and materials for the Prevention Services Workgroup

.... also participates in the Prevention Services Workgroup's meetings



To ensure selection of the <u>right</u> EBPs, we are conducting

FAMILY and YOUTH focus groups

- Youth and families with lived experiences have knowledge and insights that will help Georgia develop a statewide service array and supports for families.
- Focus groups will be coordinated and facilitated in collaboration with partners and stakeholders with access and knowledge about the groups
- Conducted in March-April 2021

The **process of selecting EBPs** for Georgia's Title IV-E Prevention Plan



The Prevention Services Workgroup will hold **six meetings** through June 2021.

Each meeting will be approximately **90 minutes**.

The structure of each meeting:

- > Presentation of **data and stakeholder input** *(including from workgroup)* to guide decision-making
- Rate or select EBPs based on data and input (facilitators will lead)
