Coalition Spotlight: Coastal Georgia Coalition

Membership Diversity

The Coastal Senior Hunger Coalition includes Action Pact (myactionpact.org), Heavenly Devine Blessings, Community Health Works (chwg.org) and the St. Joseph Candler African American Health Information and Resource Center (herohelpme.org).

Innovative Ideas and Strategies

Interns from the Savannah State University Department of Social Work, who are also coalition members, served as instructors for the Coastal Senior Hunger Nutrition Education Program. This program included three sessions once a week at four senior centers facilitated by the interns and served more than 100 older adults.

Key Resource in the Region

The Coastal Coalition identified critical resources that focused on getting nutritious food to older adults and the community. The Society of St. Andrew Gleaning Network (endhunger.org) is the oldest and largest gleaning organization, ensuring leftover crops go to hungry people instead of landfills. Farm Truck-912 (forsythfarmersmarket.com/farmtruck912) is a mobile farmers market serving Chatham County, offering brief food demonstrations and nutrition education along with serving farm-fresh products.

Meeting Challenges

We have enjoyed having many new members at each coalition meeting, but that has meant needing to re-explain the goal and purpose of the group. However, that has allowed us to make sure we are all on the same page, know the five focus areas of the state plan and has given new members a platform to share their agency's services or programs.

Accomplishments

The Coastal Coalition distributed boxes packed with farm-fresh produce to 125 older adults while also including information on Senior SNAP and ways to stay healthy during the pandemic. This initiative provided food access to five senior centers, each represented by the Coastal Senior Hunger Coalition. The funding for this initiative came from a \$5,000 mini-grant.

What's next

We are looking forward to hosting a listening session this coming year to contribute to the next state plan on senior hunger. We are also working on increasing the number of food pantries in our database managed by the Aging and Disability Resource Connection (ADRC). We are asking our community partners to share information about pantries they are aware of.

Member Highlight

First Credit Hill Church

First Credit Hill Church is dedicated to helping the community by providing meals twice a month to families. On the first Thursday of every month, the mobile food pantry at the Leisure Center distributes food to 275-325 families. On the second Saturday of every month, First Credit Hill Church provides approximately 75-150 people with meals. The church does not receive any grants or other funding – tithes and benevolence offerings fund the food.




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Statewide Updates
